Walz announces over \$5M for food security in MN

Gov. Tim Walz earlier this month announced \$5.5 million in new funding for Minnesota food shelves. 50 percent of funds will go toward food from Minnesota producers and processors, supporting the local agricultural commu-

"No family should be faced with a decision to either put food on the table or pay the bills. That's why Minnesota has taken major strides to eliminate hunger, from investments in universal school meals to millions in funding for food shelves and agriculture support," said Walz. "With this funding, we're relieving a strain on family pocketbooks and ensuring a stable supply of healthy food to meet Minnesotans' needs."

"This funding arrives during a challenging season for many Minnesota families and will help us deliver more food where it's needed most," said Second Harvest Heartland CEO Allison O'Toole. "We must continue to build on investments in the emergency food system along with universal school meals and the child tax credit in order to end hunger once and for all." "We are so grateful for this investment from

Governor Walz and the Minnesota Department of Agriculture to provide quality and local foods to the emergency food system in Minnesota. The Food Group values supporting local producers and getting food to those who need it most in our communities - this grant does both," said The Food Group Executive Director Sophia Lenarz-Coy. "We will be prioritizing more than half of the funds to source from local producers to build up our local food system and all the food will go to our network of over 200 food shelf partners. With food shelf visits in our state at record levels, this makes a sig-

The Farmers' Market Nutrition Assistance Grant will provide funding to farmers' markets in the state so they can increase participation in food assistance programs like Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Farmers' Market Nutrition (FMNP), Senior Program Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP), Market Bucks, and Power of Produce

programs help These individuals and families who are experiencing food insecurity purchase foods directly from farmers at farmers' markets.

The MDA expects to award approximately \$150,000 using a competitive review process.

Applicants may request between \$1,500 to \$10,000 per farmers' market association. There is no match requirement for this grant. If the project proposal is approved, the farmers' market association may request an advance of up to 50% of the project funding. Advance funds must be requested as a part of the application process.

To be eligible to apply, a farmers' market association must be located in Minnesota and intends to participate in at least one nutrition assistance program in 2025 that provides food directly to program participants at the farmers' market. Applications will be accepted until February 20, 2025.

Bicyclists must follow rules, too

Question: I have seen numerous times where a bicyclist will not stop at a stop sign, if they are sharing the road with automobiles. I have seen a couple of close incidents where the bicyclist is almost hit as well. Are bicyclists under the same rules if they are sharing the road with automobiles?

Answer: There was a state law change back in August of 2023. It states, "a bicycle operator who approaches a stop sign must slow to a speed that allows for stopping before entering the intersection or the nearest crosswalk. If there is not a vehicle in the vicinity, the operator may make a turn or proceed through the intersection without stopping."

Nothing in this subdivision changed the right-of-way requirements. It is important to note that bicyclists must still Ask A Trooper Sgt. Troy Christianson MN State Trooper

stop at intersections controlled by a red light, a peace officer, or a person authorized to control traffic.

Essentially, the bicyclist can yield or perform a "rolling stop" at a stop sign if they don't violate anyone else's right of way. When approaching a stop sign, the bicyclist should be traveling slow enough to stop before the crosswalk if necessary.

However, after yielding, if there is not a pedestrian crossing in front of them or other traffic approaching near enough to constitute an immediate hazard, they may continue without making a full stop.






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
